Unlocking Climate Finance for Locally-Led Action in the Caribbean

November 3, 2021

CONCEPT NOTE

Background

Unlocking climate finance is a priority for building climate resilience in vulnerable and under-resourced Caribbean small island developing states (SIDS). In particular, there is a need to expand and accelerate actions that are bottom-up and locally-led that engage civil society, and effectively meet the needs of the most vulnerable. Civil society organisations (CSOs) can play a significant role in planning and implementing adaptation and mitigation actions as well as helping to monitor and evaluate the success of actions undertaken by governments and businesses. They are also a strong force for making the voices of marginalised and vulnerable communities heard and amplified. Building the lasting in-country capacity for CSOs to contribute to this process, and to access the financing they need to do so, is crucial.

A scoping study was conducted across the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) region by the Caribbean Natural Resources Institute (CANARI), Climate Analytics and International Institute for Sustainable Development (IISD) from September 2020 to June 2021 to (1) assess current levels of CSO access to and delivery of climate finance, including from the Adaptation Fund, Green Climate Fund and Global Environment Facility; and (2) identify and assess current mechanisms for multi-stakeholder engagement, including of CSOs, in climate change decision-making at regional and national levels and their effectiveness. The study highlights key barriers and opportunities and provides concrete recommendations for improving access to climate finance for civil society, and improving their engagement in climate action, in the region.

The study was commissioned under the Green Climate Fund-funded readiness project being implemented from 2020-2022 by the Caribbean Natural Resources Institute (CANARI) and national designated authorities across CARICOM, including Antigua and Barbuda, Belize, Grenada, Jamaica, Saint Kitts and Nevis, Saint Lucia and Suriname. The lead national designated authority for the project is the Climate Change Division, Ministry of Housing, Urban Renewal, Environment and Climate Change in Jamaica. The project aims to enhance civil society’s capacity, including knowledge, skills and organisational structures, and the enabling institutional framework to improve access to climate finance and delivery of climate change adaptation and mitigation in the Caribbean. Purpose

COP26 in Glasgow, UK represents a critical moment to ensure the pledge of US\$100 billion per year to developing countries to support climate change adaptation and mitigation is fulfilled, and to highlight pathways for channeling this finance to address the needs of the most vulnerable communities and wider civil society in Caribbean SIDS and globally.
